ETYMOLOGY

People like to know where words come from, whether they be common nouns, idioms, personal names, place names, abbreviations, proverbs or any others. In our seminar, we will initially examine a number of arresting etymologies. Next, we will move on to see how words are etymologized and what makes some etymologies better justified than others. On the assumption that participants have no or very little grasp of the subject, the first semester of this seminar introduces students to the basics of etymology and linguistic research.

Focusing on uncovering concealed word structures, the aim is to sensitise students to earlier meanings as well as help them distinguish words introduced through language contact from native, inherited ones, which are sometimes remarkably similar to words in our mother tongue and may be descended from a common ancestor language. Although the homeland and many details of this proto-language remain shrouded in mystery, we are going to learn how it is possible to reconstruct surprisingly many facts about the life of our prehistoric forebears.
